Yo	u should contact your GP or NHS 111 urgently if:
1	You develop a fever, chills/shakes, sweats, a persistent cough, weight loss or excessive tiredness within 3 months of discharge You have diverticular disease and develop severe abdominal pain
	ease inform your GP that you have been treated with an IL-6 inhibitor prior to eiving any form of vaccination.
Please read the following information carefully if you have received/are receiving steroid treatment:	
1)	Steroids can affect your blood sugar levels. Please keep any appointments for ongoing monitoring of blood sugar levels. If you are known to have diabetes, you should have a discharge plan for your diabetic medicines/insulin.
,	If you have been on prolonged steroid treatment, the steroid dose may need to be reduced slowly to allow your body to start producing its own steroids again. If you develop low blood pressure, persistent dizziness or light-headedness, profound weakness, nausea and vomiting, abdominal pain or confusion, you should seek urgent medical attention at your nearest Accident and Emergency Department and take your steroid cards with you.
